There is a gentleman who comes to Heart & Soul regularly. We've known him for years. He's quiet and unassuming. His teeth were brown and obviously in need of care. We asked him one time if he wanted to get them fixed. He said he didn't have the money. As it turns out, all he needed was a little assistance in navigating the system. A couple of months ago, he walked up to Sr. Beth and waited to be acknowledged as he smiled broadly, grinning from ear to ear so his new teeth would be noticed; he was so pleased. It was a touching experience. Even more touching is the fact that he repaid Heart & Soul every penny that went toward his co-pay. That total was \$200. Each month he faithfully brought in \$25 to repay Heart & Soul. This gentleman had very limited economic means, but he had enormous dignity.

Yet, there is more to the story. We recently saw this same gentleman waiting to get his groceries from the pantry. As usual, we asked how he was, and he said that he retired. We congratulated him and asked what he was doing. He looked up and proudly said, "I'm going to Trott so I can learn how to read." So, after 37 years in a low-paying job and getting up for the 3 a.m. shift, he is now learning how to read. As you can see, statistics don't tell the whole story.

So, my friends, your ongoing generosity to the guests of Heart & Soul made it possible for this gentleman to receive much-needed dental care and to maintain his dignity. He depends on you, as do hundreds of other guests who come to Heart & Soul with various problems from across the whole spectrum of human needs. You are a partner in this ministry — thank you. "DEPOSITS FOR FOOD" TURNS CANS INTO CASH FOR LOCAL FOOD AGENCIES

Just in time for the holidays, Lewiston resident Angelo Sarkees and his "Deposits for Food" initiative presented donations totaling \$3,000 to Heart, Love & Soul Food Pantry and Community Missions on Nov. 19. The donations were the second checks the agencies have received from the program in 2014.

"Deposits for Food" began in August 2013, when Sarkees began collecting bottles, cans, and scrap metal. Since that time, more than 50,000 bottles and cans, along with 10-15 tons of scrap metal, have been collected. The resulting deposits, along with support from Modern Corp. and Sevenson Environmental Services, have resulted in over \$6,000 in donations to Heart, Love & Soul and Community Missions. Collections are expected to continue throughout the winter.

"Each time that we hear from Angelo Sarkees, we are blown away by the work that he has done," said Christian Hoffman, communications and development manager at Community Missions. "We are very fortunate to have community members offer such wonderful support of our services. We are so appreciative of his efforts and this

donation, which comes at a vital time of year as we provide food to those in need."

On Friday, Feb. 6, 2015, Passage House Shelter celebrated its 25th anniversary with a lovely dinner and awards ceremony at the Como Restaurant in Niagara Falls. Passage House is an emergency shelter for victims of domestic violence operated by Family and Children's Services of Niagara.

During the awards ceremony, Sr. Beth Brosmer accepted from Karrie Gephardt, director of Passage House, the "Passage House Community Partner Award to Heart, Love & Soul." The attractive plaque further states: "For steadfast collaboration and positive impact for survivors of domestic violence," thus attesting to various situations when Heart & Soul coordinates with the efforts of Passage House on behalf of domestic abuse victims.

BUSTLING HOLIDAYS AT HEART & SOUL

It all started at Heart & Soul about a week before Thanksgiving day. Personnel from the Chiampou Group, National Grid, and other volunteers prepared boxes containing the makings of Thanksgiving meals at home and distributed them to 328 families (664 individuals). Families of one to four received a chicken; those of five or more received a whole turkey or a turkey breast. Then our efforts turned toward the Christmas holidays.

Once again, many volunteers helped to pack 302 boxes of food with everything necessary to prepare a feast at home. This amounted to 817 meals. In collaboration with the Buffalo Niagara Partnership, toys were distributed to the parents of 338 children who had been registered at Heart & Soul. The parents enjoyed their shopping trip to the Boys and Girls Club "Toy Store." Michael Daloia and Sr. Diane Bernbeck from Heart & Soul spent the day helping at the "Toy Store."

"Angel Tree" projects at St. Peter's Church (Lewiston), St. Mary of the Cataract (Niagara Falls), Mt. St. Mary's Hospital, and Uniland resulted in lovely new clothes that were arranged for distribution at the Niagara Falls Convention Center. The parents of 371 children from 147 families received the gifts they had requested on the "Angel Trees." These requests were coordinated by Heart & Soul and the Neighborhood Health Center. Parents had the option of getting the gifts wrapped on site or taking home wrapping paper. In addition, each child received a gift basket containing socks, underwear, a hat, gloves, and scarf. Each family received a new bath towel, personal care items, toilet paper, and a religious Christmas ornament. To bolster their sense of personal pride, each family was asked to donate whatever money they felt they could afford. In turn, this money was given to a charity in Niagara Falls.

Through all this hustle and bustle, the Christmas spirit of love and caring shone brightly at Heart & Soul and all the related venues.

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POVERTY IS "FOR REAL" IN NIAGARA FALLS

Two teams: University of Buffalo Regional Institute and Mobile Safety-Net Team, an initiative of the John R. Oishei Foundation, did extensive research during 2012 and early 2013 in the City of Niagara Falls to assess and strengthen services for the poor. The groups surveyed residents, conducted resident focus groups, interviewed representative human service organizations (among them, Heart & Soul), and collected data from diverse sources. Some of their findings include the following:

- 22% or 10,899 individuals live in poverty (less than \$19,090 annually for a family of three)
- 44% (almost one in two) is either living in poverty or struggling financially and at risk.
- 30.5 % of children (one in three) live in poverty.
- 15% of girls between the ages of 15 and 19 are getting pregnant every year (about 80 pregnancies or teen parents in the Niagara Falls City School District in a given year).
- Two-thirds of the 7,300 students in the Niagara Falls School District qualify for free or reduced lunches.

These are just a very few of the statistics in the Community Report for the City of Niagara Falls. The facts have not substantially changed since then. They show, in a very concrete way, why Heart, Love & Soul, with its many services, is a vital entity in the lives of many residents in the City of Niagara Falls.
